



## POOL PAINTS

### ***“Good for a Quick Fix — Not a Forever Surface”***

Pool paints come in four major types. Each offers a different balance of cost, durability, and ease of application.

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### **Chlorinated Rubber Paint**

#### ***“Cheap and Cheerful, But Short Lived”***

##### **Pros**

- Very affordable
- DIY-friendly
- Dries fast

##### **Cons**

- Short lifespan: **2–4 years**
- Fades and chalks quickly
- Not suitable for long-term value
- Needs re-application regularly

##### **Ideal For**

Temporary fixes or properties being sold soon.

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### **Epoxy Paint**

#### ***“The Strongest of the Paint Family”***

##### **Pros**

- Hard-wearing, chemical resistant
- Smooth and shiny
- Lasts **5–7 years**
- Good mid-range renovation option

##### **Cons**

- Prep work is heavy and unforgiving
- Must apply in dry conditions
- Slippery on steps without grip additives

##### **Ideal For**

Older concrete pools where a short-term to mid-term upgrade is needed.



## Acrylic Paint

***“Quick, Cheap, and Not for Long Life”***

### Pros

- Fast recoat times
- Easy application

### Cons

- Very short lifespan: **1–3 years**
- Requires frequent reapplication

### Ideal For

Commercial pools needing quick turnarounds or very low budget properties.



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## Fluoropolymer Paint

***“Modern High-Tech Coating With Extra Bite”***

### Pros

- Great chemical and UV resistance
- Longer-lasting than other paint systems
- Attractive surface sheen

### Cons

- Higher cost
- Requires correct prep and training

### Ideal For

Owners wanting a better paint option without jumping to epoxy or fibreglass.
