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Turning Your Backyard Pool into a True Aussie Staycation

A practical, down-to-earth guide for Australian homeowners

For many Australians, the backyard swimming pool isn't just a luxury — it's a lifestyle anchor. It's where kids grow up, friends gather, and weekends slow down. Done right, your pool area can feel less like "the back yard" and more like a **private resort**, without needing to book flights or fight for sun lounges.

A staycation-style pool environment isn't about copying a five-star hotel. It's about **designing for your climate, your block, your budget, and how you actually live**. Understanding Australia's Climate Zones (Before You Design Anything)

Australia isn't one climate — and pool landscapes that work in one state can fail badly in another.

Tropical & Subtropical (QLD, NT, Northern WA)

Hot, humid, high rainfall, intense UV.

Design focus:

- Shade, airflow, mould resistance
- Non-slip paving
- Chlorine-tolerant plants
- Materials that won't warp, rust or fade

Avoid:

- Dense planting that blocks airflow
- Cheap outdoor furniture
- Timber decks without airflow underneath

Temperate & Coastal (NSW, VIC, SA, TAS)

Seasonal variation, cooler winters, salt air near the coast.

Design focus:

- Wind protection
- Heating considerations
- Materials resistant to salt corrosion
- Flexible shade solutions

Avoid:

- Untreated steel
- Polished stone near pools
- Fully exposed seating areas

Arid & Inland (Outback, Western NSW, SA interior)

Hot summers, cold winters, dust and wind.

Design focus:

- Wind breaks
- Heat-resistant paving
- Minimal water-hungry plants
- Night-time usability

Avoid:

- Lawns near pools
 - Large leafy trees
 - Dark paving that stores heat
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The Staycation Mindset: How Will You Actually Use the Space?

Before picking plants or paving, ask:

- Is this mainly for **family use**, entertaining, or relaxation?
- Daytime use, night-time use — or both?
- Adults only, or kids front-and-centre?

A great staycation backyard often has **zones**:

- Swimming zone
- Lounging zone
- Cooking & eating zone
- Quiet / retreat zone
- Circulation (walking paths)

You don't need all of them — but even modest yards benefit from intentional zoning.

Budget Ranges: What's Realistic?

Modest Budgets (\$5k–\$20k)



Focus on:

- Smart paving
- Shade umbrellas or sails
- Quality seating
- Lighting upgrades
- Strategic planting

This is where **layout and restraint** matter most.

Mid-Range Budgets (\$20k–\$60k)

Adds:

- Built-in seating
- Pergolas or gazebos
- Outdoor kitchens or BBQ areas
- Feature lighting
- Better materials



High-End Budgets (\$60k–\$150k+)

Opens the door to:

- Attached spas
- Water features
- Custom shade structures
- Fire features
- Premium stone and lighting systems

Good design matters more than budget — plenty of six-figure yards feel cold and unusable.



Paving: What to Use — and What to Avoid

Best Choices

- **Textured porcelain pavers** – non-slip, low maintenance, colour stable
- **Exposed aggregate concrete** – excellent grip, cost-effective
- **Natural stone (sealed)** – travertine and limestone stay cooler underfoot

Use with Caution

- **Timber decking** – can be brilliant, but needs airflow, sealing, and maintenance
- **Concrete tiles** – must be slip-rated

Avoid Near Pools

- Polished stone
- Gloss tiles
- Small loose pavers
- Cheap concrete that cracks or stains

Hot tip: pale colours stay cooler. Dark paving around pools is a barefoot nightmare.

Shade: Non-Negotiable in Australia

No shade = no staycation.

Good Options

- Cantilever umbrellas (flexible, movable)
- Shade sails (great for modern yards)
- Pergolas with adjustable louvres
- Gazebos for defined zones

Avoid

- Fixed shade that blocks winter sun
- Structures that trap heat
- Cheap umbrellas that fade or snap

Design shade to protect **people**, not just water.

BBQs & Outdoor Kitchens

A pool without food nearby is half a solution.

Simple BBQ Setups

- Built-in gas BBQ
- Small bench and storage
- Shade overhead

Full Outdoor Kitchens

- Sink, fridge, storage
- Weatherproof cabinetry
- Proper ventilation

Avoid placing BBQs:

- Downwind of seating
- Too close to the pool edge
- Under low ceilings

Slides, Spas & Family Features

Pool Slides

Great fun, but:

- Need space
- Must meet safety codes
- Best for family-focused yards

Attached Spas

One of the best staycation upgrades:

- Extends pool use year-round
- Social focal point
- Adds value



Kids' Zones

- Shallow lounging shelves
- Step seating
- Clear sightlines from the house

Furniture: Comfort Beats Looks

Choose **outdoor-rated** everything.

Best Materials

- Powder-coated aluminium
- UV-stabilised resin
- Marine-grade stainless steel

Avoid

- Indoor furniture outdoors
- Cheap cushions
- Timber that splinters

Sun lounges should:

- Adjust easily
- Drain water
- Be easy to move



Plants & Trees: Choose Wisely or Regret It

Best Poolside Plants

- Lomandra
- Liriope
- Mondo grass
- Heliconia (tropics)
- Succulents (dry climates)
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Trees to Use Carefully

- Palms (low litter types)
- Frangipani (minimal leaf drop)



Trees to Avoid Near Pools

- Jacarandas (flowers everywhere)
- Bottlebrush
- Deciduous trees
- Fruit trees
- Anything with berries or sap

Roots, leaves and pollen = more cleaning and chemistry issues.

Wind Breaks & Privacy

Wind ruins pool comfort faster than cold water.

Options include:

- Glass fencing
- Slatted screens
- Dense hedging (away from pool edge)
- Architectural walls

Design to block wind **without blocking airflow**.

Night-Time Lighting: Where Staycations Shine

Lighting turns a pool into an experience.

Key Lighting Types

- In-pool LED lighting
- Path lighting
- Feature uplighting on plants
- Soft ambient wall lights

Avoid:

- Harsh floodlights
- Blue-white lighting
- Over-lighting

Warm light = relaxed vibe.

Walking & Relaxation Areas

Paths matter more than people think.

Good paths:

- Are non-slip
- Stay cool
- Flow naturally
- Connect zones

Add:

- Garden benches
- Quiet corners
- Water features or fire bowls

This turns a pool area into somewhere you *linger*.

Final Thoughts: Build It in Layers

The best staycation backyards are rarely built all at once.

Start with:

1. **Layout**
2. **Paving**
3. **Shade**
4. **Seating**
5. **Lighting**
6. **Planting**
7. **Features**

Think long-term, design for your climate, and avoid trends that won't last.
